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Trustees' report For the year ended 31 August 2023

The trustees present their report of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRS 102) in preparing the annual report and financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice" applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the CIO are the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation, in particular by the provision of facilities, encouragement and instruction in the sport of rowing, for the benefits of the inhabitants of Newcastle upon Tyne and surrounding areas.

We aim to further the sport of rowing by providing facilities for exercise, competition and recreation on the water and on land, safely.

Main activities include:

- Rowing in a variety of boats on the Tyne and at competitions elsewhere
- · Learning to row and handle boats safely
- Training coaches and coxes
- Coaching at all levels of the sport
- Launch handling and safety
- Maintenance and repair of boats and other equipment
- Pilates and related exercise classes
- Weight training, Strength and conditioning
- Cross training running, circuits, cycling.
- Social and fund-raising activities
- Volunteering in a wide range of activities essential to successful management and operation of the club, including governance, fund-raising, catering, competition and event organisation, grounds, boat, and building maintenance, trailer and launch driving; safety, welfare and assisting crews and coaches.
- Venue for training events and local community activities (E.g. local book club, award ceremonies)

Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit (PB1, PB2 and PB3).

Volunteers are essential in helping with managing and supporting the club. Without volunteers the club could not exist. Volunteers contribute to the following:

- Governance of the club
- Maintaining premises, equipment and property, day-to-day
- Coaching the sport of rowing and related training activity at all levels of participation
- Supporting events, competitions and competitors
- · Planning and organising social and sporting events
- Safety on and off the water
- Welfare
- Catering
- Fund-raising

Achievement and performance

- Participant and volunteer numbers at all levels and in all activities have continued to improve post pandemic. Above all membership levels are rising with a noticeable increase in women members. This secures the club as a viable organisation providing a good quality experience for sports, activities, and events.
- A successful head racing and regatta season enabling competition at all levels for those wishing to race, to take part at all ability levels and raising a healthy income for the club from the efforts of our volunteers running home events.
- Land-based activities allowing the club to offer a full range of exercise, and training options, and some introductory weights sessions to encourage more members, particularly women, to use the gym with confidence.
- Expansion of daytime Pilates and yoga classes, body weight training, strength, and conditioning, rowing machines ("ergos"), static bike and spinning classes.
- 2022-3 saw many rowers competing in local and national competitions. A senior women's VIII won the
 provincial club pennant at the prestigious national Women's Eights Head of the River Race on the
 Thames in March. In the summer five junior crews qualified to represent the region at the British Rowing
 Junior Inter-Regional Regatta and a junior girl was invited to attend the under 18 GB Rowing Camp
 Masters, Juniors, Development and Senior squads trained hard to race and achieved well-earned wins.
- Our Tyne Youth Rowing (TYR) programme has been developed as a key objective of the club's strategy for 2023-2028. Taster sessions were held with Walbottle Academy, St Cuthberts and Boldon Schools and a rowing camp for 15 refugee and asylum-seeking children, funded by "Love Rowing" a British Rowing Charitable Foundation. Applications were invited for two part-time coaches.
- The TYR programme, starting in September 2023, will be (approx.) 39-weeks and will be based at Tyne ARC. working with up to 4 schools, each school completing a half-day session per week. The project is funded by the Henley Stewards Committee supporting youngsters from low income households to experience rowing. As a collaborative team sport, we want to help participants develop key life skills, including communication, problem-solving, time management and most importantly self-confidence. An expansion of funding to support more schools and participants is planned for 2024.
- Daytime community rowing has continued to increase in terms of attendances and skill development requiring the support of an additional coach and safety launch.
- An experienced rower has rowed the Talisker Atlantic Challenge for a second time, supporting forces veterans charities. Another would-be Atlantic rowing novice has been learning and training with the Community Rowing group.
- Successful Adult and Junior "Learn to Row" programmes took place during the summer months and our healthy waiting list indicates that there is no shortage of interest in the local community for learning to row.
- Sale and purchase of boats continues, supported by a rigorous programme of boat and equipment maintenance, has enabled rowers of all abilities access to water training, facilitating progress in all squads.
- Increased diversity is evident, especially in the junior squad, the new youth rowing programme and the sessions to introduce refugee children to rowing and social activities at the club led by former Junior rower Bridget Stratford MBE. Bridget co-founded the North East Solidarity and Teaching Charity (N.E.S.T.) with Newcastle University Students Union, to help refugees and asylum seekers in Tyneside.
- Retention and a modest expansion of the team of paid coaching staff and development of volunteer coaches and launch drivers.
- Continued partnerships with neighbouring clubs.
- Use of the club facilities for charitable fundraising events (e.g.Stroke Association, Streetwrx –a local church outreach group supporting homeless people), and similar organisations.

- Partnerships with other sports clubs and organisations, including Red Seal Rescue, Sea Cadets, School and University rowing clubs for local rowing competitions, training camps (e.g. King's School Canterbury) and water safety.
- Community support includes use of premises by local sports clubs, particularly walking, running, and cycling e.g., Newburn Running Club, Elswick Harriers, Blaydon Youth F C, Walbottle Junior F C, and Method Fitness.
- Use of facilities by Physio Smart (Physiotherapy treatment), Pilates instruction classes, Barre and Yoga classes, a wreath making workshop, "Nifty Fifties" Sword Dancing, and Interfaith Spiritual Ceremony Exchange Indentureship.
- Other water-based activities e.g canoe and kayak launching and training, paddleboard events
- Partnership with University of Northumbria who use the club's facilities and are provided with coaching.
 Talks are in progress to expand this partnership.
- New partnerships are currently being explored involving possible improvements to the bar, catering, external infrastructure and providing electric vehicle charging.
- A defibrillator, accessible to the public, is maintained by the club.

Financial review

With the pandemic hopefully behind us, member levels are now healthy. Fund-raising and a full programme of events and social activities have resumed.

Principal sources of funds are:

- Membership fees and boat storage fees a modest increase has been agreed in response to rising costs and inflation.
- Grant applications
- Sponsorship
- Donations and bequests
- Fundraising through sporting and social events
- Food and refreshment sales
- Committee room rental
- Exercise space rental
- Treatment room rental
- Racking fees for boats and payments from partner organisations sharing our facilities
- Income from the café-bar and hospitality generated by the wholly owned subsidiary company Tyne 1852 which has two directors, one of whom is a Trustees of Tyne ARC. The bar has extended its opening hours and catering to accommodate more lunchtime customers from the local community, daytime rowers and those walking and cycling the Hadrian's Way National Trail and Cycleway which passes directly in front of the clubhouse.

The club reinvests all surplus revenue into its rowing and associated health and fitness activities and the facilities and equipment required to support them.

Principal risks the charity faces

- A decline in interest in the sport of rowing and associated activities, leading to a fall in club membership and thus reduced subscription income
- Insufficient boats, coaching and equipment for those who wish to participate in the sport of rowing, leading to a fall in club membership
- Cancellation of events through adverse weather, low take-up, lack of volunteers and support
- Withdrawal of key sponsors, partners, and donors
- Cancellation of some or all club activity because of unforeseen events e.g., pandemic, policy decisions by government, or the national sporting body (British Rowing), resulting in loss of members and income
- Impact of inflation on operating costs, individual member and income generating activities

Reserves policy

The reserve must ensure that the CIO is able to meet day to day operational costs for six months should all income cease. This sum is currently £30,000 and trustees and Independent Examiner's review this annually.

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Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) was incorporated on 13 April 2015 and is registered with the Charity Commission under number 1161250.

Organisational structure

Trustees are elected at the AGM. All trustees must be full members of the club.

All trustees are provided with essential guidance documents including constitution, code for meeting, charity commission publications particularly "The essential Trustee" and Public Benefit guidance. (PB1,2&3).

Trustees review annually the list of delegations, alongside terms and conditions which give a Rowing Committee responsibility for the day-to-day organisation of the sport, including the welfare of members, all training schedules and maintenance and care of equipment.

On 14 March 2018 Tyne ARC established the wholly owned subsidiary company Tyne 1852 Limited for the purposes of fund raising. A servicing undertaking is established between the two bodies with all profits of Tyne 1852 Limited directed to its parent company.

Trustees' report (Continued) For the year ended 31 August 2023

To assist in fulfilling a key role managing the venue, the full time Club Manager is supported by a management group consisting of the Chair of Trustees, a Trustee, Directors of Tyne 1852, the Chair of the Rowing committee, the Treasurer, and secretary. The group meets fortnightly.

Related parties

- The CIO works with or has hosted the following groups and organisations:
- The club is an affiliate of British Rowing, the sport's national body and with the Northern Rowing Council, the regional liaison body between local clubs and the national body.
- Sport England
- British Universities and Colleges Sport (BUCS) hosting their annual national long- distance fours and eights head.
- Partnerships with local clubs and organisations (Sea Cadets, amateur, school and university rowing clubs, Red Seal Rescue) for local water safety, local rowing competitions and by visiting clubs and individuals in the region, who wish to train on the River Tyne for longer distance events, or when water conditions at the smaller clubs are unsuitable for rowing.
- Support including use of premises for local sports clubs and charity events particularly walking, cycling & running. e.g., Newburn running club, Elswick Harriers, Blaydon Youth FC, Walbottle junior FC, Method Fitness, Jewish community group, and Charity cycle rides
- King's School, Chester and N.E.S.T. refugee charity junior rowing camps.
- Use of facilities by sports physio and massage therapists, Pilates instruction classes and other health and fitness opportunities, which are open to non-members
- Other water -based activities (e.g., Canoe launching and training, paddleboard events)
- · University of Northumbria who use the club's facilities and the CIO provides coaching
- · Developing use of venue by local businesses and organisations for training sessions

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2023

1. Accounting Policies

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2020, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. Annual budgets take into account. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2023

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Depreciation of tangible fixed assets is provided by equal annual instalments so as to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with instant access from the date of opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Taxation

The charity is subject to tax on its trading activities in accordance with UK tax legislation.
